3 reasons why Hillsong Church is succeeding

Theologian Dr Robert Beckford explains.....

Hillsong London is the only church I've ever been into where I felt old! It was an amazing spectacle to see 3,000 people worshipping God. 70% of them are under 25. I was participating in a worship service in a theatre with smoke and multimedia screens. It was very dynamic and very modern. There are 3 powerful ingredients to its success:

1) Practical preaching

The preaching is not traditional biblical homiletics with 3 points that rhyme or have the same letter at the beginning. It's much more about practical talk to young people about how to live their lives with integrity and dignity. All of the churches we went to that were doing well had charismatic preachers who are able to make the message clear, plain, accessible and practical.

2) Dynamic worship

It's a rave! What we're seeing now is an appropriation of rave culture by the Church. So churches become a celebration and use music. Lots of people jumping up and down, getting into the groove, shouting out things. That pan-human capacity for expression is a powerful draw for people. Lots of young people attract lots of young people.

3) Cosmopolitan congregation

It's a church for all nations. If you look across the congregation it's a wide spectrum of young people across London who go there and lots of people of mixed heritage. There's a cosmopolitan sensibility. People are urban, the cultures are dynamic and flow into each other. It provides one safe space for everyone - no matter what part of London they're from.

How do you pray when the world becomes a war zone?

Gerard Kelly of the Bless Network in Europe gives guidance on how to pray in light of the Brussels attacks and a world where terror is on all of our doorsteps.

The recent attacks in Brussels have sent shock waves once again through Europe. We stand with our brothers and sisters, the people of Belgium, as they come to terms with loss, injury and fear. What do you do when such a blow is struck against you? Reach for a gun? Ban immigration? Take out your anger and frustrations on the refugees flooding into Europe? None of these responses help, because none of them get to the root of the real problem. Anger sometimes makes us feel better, but if we direct it at the wrong people, it is more likely to make their situation and ours worse than ever. So what can we do?

1. We can pray for peace.

When Jesus came into Jerusalem he rode on a donkey, fulfilling the prophecy of Zechariah 9:9. This is not a symbol of poverty, but of peace. Kings did ride donkeys in the ancient world, but they did so to indicate that they came in peace. If you want war, come on a horse. Jesus speaks peace to our cities. Peace to Paris. Peace to Brussels. Peace to London. Wherever Jesus arrives, he arrives to bring peace. Can we join him in praying for the peace of our cities?

2. Muslims are not the enemy.

We can know that terrorists are as much the enemy of our muslim neighbours as they are of us. Terrorism is a choice by non-military personnel to adopt a military approach to their problems. It is the victory of violence over reason and of cruelty over community. It does not and cannot be a representative action of a community, because by its very nature it destroys community. Community by definition agree the rules by which they will live together. Terrorists by definition trash them.

3. We can pray for those who are stalked by fear.

The Psalmist was right in telling us that it is not death itself but the shadow of death that most oppresses us. Fear causes people to retreat from trust and its corollary, faith. We need to pray urgently that the peoples of Europe will not be ruled by fear; that courage and wisdom will prevail, even against such attacks. Perfect love, John tells us, sends fear packing. Can we pray for a revolution of love across our cities?

Every act of love is an act of the dismissal of fear. Every decision to trust weakens the forces of destruction. Every prayer for peace denies violence a place at the table. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who knew a thing or two about politically sanctioned violence, said that "The Christian must treat his enemy as a brother, and requite his hostility with love. His behaviour must be determined not by the way others treat him, but by the treatment he himself receives from Jesus; it has only one source, and that is the will of Jesus." We pray that the people of Belgium will know the peace and consolation of a God of love, and know that violence will not - cannot - ever win

(Reminder) Churches Together in Britain and Ireland have announced that Racial Justice Sunday is to move from the 2nd Sunday in September to the 2nd Sunday of February. This is because Education Sunday (in England and Wales) is moving to the 2nd Sunday in September (which makes logical sense) and CTBI want to ensure that every opportunity is offered to churches to mark Racial Justice Sunday and to make use of the resources that they provide. This means that the next Racial Justice Sunday will be marked on the 12th February 2017.



The British Pakistani Christian Association (BPCA) is organizing a London protest to demand that governments around the world start protecting religious minorities.

"The horrors of the Easter massacre, deliberately targeting children enjoying the high-point of the Easter celebrations, have shocked the globe," wrote Wilson Chowdhry, BPCA chairman. "Jesus' resurrection from the tomb will be a focus of this event and will be prayerfully reflected upon. We will also have speakers from various religious backgrounds calling for the unity of mankind against oppressors," he added.

The protest is set for Saturday at Pakistan's High Commission in London. The protest comes after an Easter Sunday bomb attack in Lahore where 73 people—mostly women and children— were killed.

The Radical Islamic group Jamaat-ul-Ahrar has claimed responsibility for the attack, saying that they targeted Christians. This week, Pakistan's army detained some 216 people in connection with the bombing.

The BPCA has set up a donation page to help the victims and families of the attack.

"Our donations will help secure medical supplies and pay for hospital treatments, pay for funeral costs and help with the long term rehabilitation and trauma counseling of victims," the BPCA said.

Most hospitals fail in their care of elderly people, a review has found.

The report is the first since the controversial Liverpool Care Pathway was scrapped. Co-funded by the charity Marie Curie, it found only 11 per cent of hospital trusts in England provide specialist palliative care around the clock.

This means those who die overnight or at the weekend may not have the right care.

Dr Adrian Tookman, a clinical director at Marie Curie said a "real effort" had been made to improve care for the dying.

"It is an area that is too often neglected either because people don't want to talk about it or because it is seen as a 'Cinderella service'," he said.

Thompson went on to say the debate over palliative care was crucial to the question of assisted suicide.

He continued: "One of the main drivers for those people who argue for a change in law on euthanasia is the misinformed belief that people die horribly in hospitals, hospices or at home when in actual fact with good palliative care, and we have the best hospice movement in the world, that is not the case.



ISIS Releases Assyrian Christian Girl

ISIS has released an Assyrian Christian girl who was taken hostage in February 2015 with more than 200 other captives.

Christian Today reports that Miriam David Talya was released on Easter Sunday, although she was initially scheduled to be released on February 22. After being released, she was greeted by the Bishop of Syria, Mar Afram Athneil.

Talya is thought to be the last captive taken in ISIS' raid on the villages along the Khabur River on February 23, 2015. Her health and condition has not been reported.

The Assyrian Church of the East Relief Organisation (ACERO) confirmed that no ISIS hostages remain. However, the Assyrian International News Agency reports that the militants are yet holding one girl captive, and have married her off to a high-ranking ISIS official.

Christian Today notes that the Assyrian Christian Church of the East has ancient roots in the region, dating back to the first century A.D. However, church leaders have spoken out in recent months, saying that Christianity could soon be wiped out in the region because of Islamic State violence.
